## GOOD NEWS CORNER! Malama Kipuka Hawaii



Malama Kipuka Hawaii is an all-volunteer non-profit organization that is committed to establishing vibrant community areas. Their mission is to foster connection within communities by forming partnerships with government, businesses, residents, and other community stakeholders to activate existing underutilized public space and find creative ways to dedicate and convert existing private space for public use.

Councilmember Say and Councilmember Fukunaga presented Malama Kipuka Hawaii with a certificate recognizing and commending their tremendous work at the Makiki Cartwright Neighborhood Park.

Rob Iopa, Director of Malama Kipuka Hawaii, first observed the demand for improvements at Cartwright Field, the world's oldest permanent baseball field, while coaching his son's Little League baseball team at the field.

In conjunction with players and family members of the Manoa Crowns baseball team and Central Union 777 Eagle Scout Troup, Malama Kipuka Hawaii completed the first phase of its agreement with the City. They cleaned off the graffiti on the overpass wall; painted a mural that would celebrate baseball and the park's namesake; cleaned and painted the boundary of the baseball field and the park's restroom; and repaired the score booth stairs and repainted the wood. Future plans for continued improvements to the field, basketball court, and restrooms are being planned by Malama Kipuka Hawaii.

### **Reapportionment Commission**

WHO: 2021 Council Reapportionment Commission. Visit https://www.honolulu.gov/elections/reapportionment.html for detailed maps and information

WHAT: Reapportionment ensures each political district has been created equally using census data. Reapportionment is conducted every ten (10) years following the census. Redistricting occurs after each decennial Census to equalize and adjust the City Council district boundaries due to population changes and shifts within the City and County of Honolulu.

**WHEN**: On or before January 2 of the year following appointment, the commission shall file with the city clerk a reapportionment plan, which shall be applicable to the next succeeding election at which councilmembers are elected to regular terms. Upcoming dates are listed on the first page.

WHERE: Members of the public will not be allowed into the meeting room but may view the meeting on a live broadcast. The meeting will be viewable: (1) by televised live broadcast on Olelo TV Channel 54 and (2) by internet live streaming through Olelo and Youtube.

WHY: Redistricting occurs after each decennial Census to equalize and adjust the City Council district boundaries due to population changes and shifts within the City and County of Honolulu. It is important because the new maps will be effective for the next ten years and affects who is eligible to represent you (beginning from the next election cycle).

### HAWAIIAN HUMANE SOCIETY

President & CEO Anna Neubauer, who started her role in 2019 at The Hawaiian Humane Society shared a behind the scenes tour of the HHS facilities. The HHS is guided by the ideals of socially conscious sheltering and is focused on being a community-driven animal welfare organization. It was hard to pass by all the animals and not take every single one home, but it was good to know that the various critters are well taken care of by the HHS staff and volunteers, including vets and animal behavioral specialists.

What you see when you visit are the animals that are ready for adoption, but behind the scenes are a lot more hopeful pets waiting for their turn to find their fur-ever home. We walked the path from intake to adoption and got to see the process these animals go through. In their 2019-2020 FY, the Hawaiian Humane Society welcomed 17,841 animals onto their campus, 6,871 were adopted, and 2,355 lost pets were returned to their humans.

One of their initiatives is the Pet Food Bank. This program provides temporary assistance to pet owners struggling to feed their animals and relies on donations from the community. Especially in these times of uncertainty, making sure that there isn't food insecurity for our favorite furry and feathered friends is one less worry for struggling pet owners.
