311 is an app and website (not a phone number) for non-emergency matter Call 911 for emergencies. You can text 911 if you are unable to call.

The Honolulu 311 application and website enable community members to report non-emergency incidents.

city legislative highlights:

- Resolution 23-113 Urges the Department of Parks and Recreation to establish revised night closure hours for Kalo Place Mini Park in order to reduce late night illegal activity.
- Relating to the full-time nature of the Council
 - Resolution 23-109 Initiates amendments to the revised Charter of the City and County of Honolulu relating to prohibiting certain other employment and emoluments while holding office.
 - o Bill 33 (2023) which would prohibit Councilmembers from holding other employment while holding office.
- Budget Package: The City Council will pass the budget package out on June 7, 2023, at which point it will be sent to the Mayor's office for signature.
- Real Property Tax: The Permitted Interaction Group has submitted their report and findings. Recommended RPT measures will be heard for third reading at the June 7, 2023 Council meeting, which you can stream here: https://www.honolulucitycouncil.org/meetings

Did You Know?


In a recent conversation, someone pondered the origin of Hardesty Street in Pālolo. Samuel Clinton Hardesty was born in Missouri in 1855. He was a contractor by trade and a member of the Honolulu Board of Supervisors in 1912.







Mauka of Hanahau'oli School is Archie Baker Mini Park. Who was Archie Baker? Archibald Baker was born and raised in Honolulu and served as Superintendent of Field Operation with the Board of Water Supply (BWS). Adjacent to the mini park is a BWS pumping station.
