Rail to Open June 30th from East Kapolei to Aloha Stadium

The first phase of the City's rail project will open for passenger service on June 30th between the Kualaka`i Station in East Kapolei and the Hālawa Station near Aloha Stadium. All rides on the new rail system will be free for the entire opening weekend, a period spanning between 2 p.m. on June 30, the day the system opens, until the last train runs on Tuesday, July 4, 2023. Additionally, TheBus will also be waiving fares for all riders between July 1 and July 4. Between 2 p.m. and 6 p.m. on June 30, rail passengers will be welcome to tour any of the nine stations that will be open for service and hop on any train, in either direction, free of charge. Fare gates at all nine stations will be open to all riders until service ends at 6 p.m. that evening. Beginning on Saturday, July 1, the first full day of rail service, passengers must have a valid HOLO card in order to take advantage of the free fare service. Riders will be required to tap their HOLO cards at fare gates to enter individual stations, but fares will not be deducted from those cards.

DPP Steps Up Short-Term Rental Enforcement, Fines Violators



On the heels of CM Dos Santos-Tam's efforts to encourage DPP to crack down on monster home construction in our neighborhoods, our office was pleased to see DPP stepping up on their short-term vacation rental enforcement. From March 1 to May 4, DPP issued 21 Notices of Violation for illegal short-term vacation rentals in our district, including in 'Ālewa Heights, Nuʻuanu Valley, Pauoa, and Downtown Honolulu. DPP also issued a Notice of Violation to the operator of an illegal "Turo" rental car operation in a Nu'uanu Valley neighborhood. CM Dos Santos-Tam continues to be opposed to the proliferation of illegal short-term vacation rentals and the improper overcommercialization of our residential neighborhoods, and our office will take reports from neighbors seriously.

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Bill 7 Project Tour

With affordable housing being such a key issue in the community, CM Dos Santos-Tam joined his state colleagues, Rep. Troy Hashimoto and Sen. Stanley Chang, for a visit to a "Bill 7" apartment project in the Makiki-Punchbowl area. The "Bill 7" project allows for more flexibility in building units in existing apartment-zoned areas, waives certain City permitting fees, and also allows developers to tap into a City incentive fund after completion. Recently, the City Council extended the lifespan of the "Bill 7" program so that it now sunsets in mid-2030. CM Dos Santos-Tam plans to introduce a proposal later this year to further refine the Bill 7 program so it provides more flexibility and also benefits to the surrounding communities.

Bill 28: Cutting Down on Drug Overdoses


With the opioid crisis spreading nationally, including here in Hawai'i, CM Dos Santos-Tam introduced Bill 28 which would require bars and nightclubs to have doses of the anti-opioid spray naloxone, also called "Narcan" on premises. Because alcohol can interact with opioids in someone's system, these venues are places where there is a higher risk of a deadly overdose. "Narcan" was recently approved by the FDA for over-the-counter sales, and Councilmember Dos Santos-Tam is now working with the State Department of Health, the

City's Liquor Commission, and private groups like HHHRC to make the required prevention doses available for free to bar and nightclub owners. This is a measure to protect public health and also to get "ahead of the curve," especially considering the 500% increase in opioid overdoses in Hawai'i between 2018-2020 and the 274 opioid overdose deaths in the islands in 2020 alone.

Bill 20: Restricted Parking Zone Bill and Town Hall

CM Dos Santos-Tam and Representative Mizuno hosted a town hall meeting to discuss the City Council, Bill 20, which would make the existing RPZ program permanent and create a framework for other neighborhoods to create RPZs. Based on community input our office is further revising the bill to expand equity across the island.

How would Bill 20 affect the current RPZ zones?

Currently, all RPZs are temporary. Bill 20 would make the zones permanent. Currently, the only way to expand an RPZ is to pass a bill, which can take years. Bill 20 would allow the Department of Transportation to expand or change an RPZ at any time. Currently, households can purchase a maximum as four permits. Bill 20 would allow residents to apply for an exemption where they could purchase additional permits.

How would Bill 20 help areas without a current RPZ zone?

The current RPZ program can only be created after 1) residents sign and submit a petition, 2) the County becomes a study, and 3) the City Council passes a bill. Bill 20 makes it so an RPZ can be created at any time as long as there is a need and community support. At the moment the cost of an RPZ permit vary. Bill 20 would make permit costs the same for all RPZs.

Bill 3 Signed: Addresses Pālama Encampment

On May 11 CM Dos Santos-Tam and his staff were able to join the Mayor in his office to sign his bill addressing the homeless encampment in Pālama. For far too long there has been problems emanating most specifically on Kanoa Street, an area of the district which has been hit hard by crime, drugs, and homelessness. With the help of other City departments and community members we were able to pass this price of legislation.

Honolulu and Majuro, the capital of the Marshall Islands, have been "sister cities" for thirteen years, and we look forward to continuing to partner with the Marshall Islands and our local Marshallese community on issues such as cultural exchanges, climate change issues, economic development, public health and more. CM Dos Santos-Tam also joined members of our local Micronesian community for the "Celebrate Micronesia"

Requesting State Help on Excessive Vehicle Noise

Our office often receives complaints of loud vehicular noise that occurs nearly nightly in some neighborhoods. Earlier this year, the legislature passed SB588, which was introduced by all three Senators who represent portions of Council District 6: Senators Moriwaki, Kim, and Rhoads. The bill allows the Dept. of Transportation to develop and implement a pilot program to use noise detection traffic cameras to address excessive traffic noise in urban areas in each participating county. As the program begins implementation, CM Dos Santos-Tam penned a letter to the Director of the State Dept. of Transportation asking for Downtown and Pali Highway to be prioritized as pilot areas.





Pearl Harbor Sub USS Bowfin Celebrates 80 Years

The submarine *USS Bowfin*, which proudly plied the Pacific during WWII, celebrated the 80th anniversary of her commissioning in May. The *Bowfin* is now the centerpiece of the USS Bowfin Submarine Museum & Park at Pearl Harbor, which helps to remember those who participated in America's "silent service." Today, they serve as a convener to unite the nation and improve maternal and infant health in the U.S.

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Investigating Missing and Damaged Signage in Pacific Heights



Several Pacific Heights neighbors notified our office that a high number of street signs were missing in the Pacific Heights area, some of which had been missing for years. Our staff traversed up Pacific Heights taking video of all the missing or faded signs until reaching the top and went back down, and compared the signs that are in place with what was indicated on the departmental blueprints. Beyond the missing signs, there were also a high number of faded and obstructed signs, and also signs that are currently in place but not recorded on the department's blueprints. Our office submitted a letter detailing the missing, faded, and obstructed signs to the Department of Transportation Services and the Department of Facility Maintenance for their action. Our office hopes to see their progress on replacing and providing visibility to the signs as residents go to and from their home.

Honuakaha New Resident Manager Meet & Greet

After months of complaints about conditions at the Honuakaha Senior Housing complex in Kaka'ako, CM Dos Santos-Tam, Speaker Scott Saiki, and Senator Sharon Moriwaki were pleased to learn that a new manager has been brought in to help address residents' concerns. The new manager was brought in due to the recent decline in living conditions and threats of eviction during the tenure of the previous management. The new resident manager, Amanda Fryer, introduced herself to residents at a townhall sponsored by CM Dos Santos-Tam's office, along with Sen. Moriwaki and Speaker Saiki. During the townhall, she was able to speak directly with the renters to talk about ways the complex can be improved. Ms. Fryer spent most of her career in education, but a few years ago switched to being a resident manager.

Downtown-Chinatown Infrastructure Improvements Underway



There are several infrastructure improvements underway in the Downtown-Chinatown area, which Councilmember Dos Santos-Tam has been strongly supporting:

On Kekaulike Mall, work is underway to improve pavement, lighting and electric lines, drainage, trees and landscaping, and more. The \$4.4 million project is scheduled to be completed in October.

Repaving work on Downtown streets began in early May, and will continue until mid-November. The streets that are slated for improvement are Bishop Street, Adams Lane, Fort Street, King Street, Punchbowl Street, Richards Street, and the portion of Pali Highway between Vineyard Blvd and Beretania Street. The work will also include improvements to curbs, manhole covers, and traffic loop detectors.

Chinatown sidewalk improvement work, which began in February, has hit full swing, with work ongoing currently on Hotel Street and Maunakea Street.

In all cases, access to businesses will be maintained so minimize inconvenience to customers and area residents.

Heavy equipment started work near the intersection of Kekaulike Mall and North King Street in April, and now work has progressed further up the mall.

Hawaiian Humane Society Spay and Neuter: Free Roaming Cats Program



The Hawaiian Humane Society has a program that is humane way to lower the Free-Roaming cat population over time. The spay and neuter procedures for Free-Roaming cats include anesthesia, surgery, microchip, ear notch, FVRCP vaccine and post-operative pain medication. This service is available Free-Roaming Cat Spay/Neuter surgeries are by online appointment only. All online requests are first-come, first-serve for Wednesdays and Thursdays, and limited to 4 cats per person or organization.

Councilmember Tyler Dos Santos-Tam and State Rep. John Mizuno are teaming up to hold a town hall and workshop on June 24th in Kalihi Valley so community members can learn about Albizia and how to remove the hazard.

1. Identify


Albizia has small green leaves. Leaves form clusters at the growing tip. These trees grow up to 15 feet per year.






2. Assess

Is my tree a hazard? Albizia taller than 15 feet growing within a distance less than 1.5 times its height from roads, structures, power lines or anything of value are or will become hazard trees.





Estimated growth rate of Albizia over time and approximate removal cost

Albizia grows rapidly in the first 5 years, making branches brittle. In good conditions, Albizia can grow roughly 15 feet per year, up to 150 feet.

Because of the fast growth, branches are large and brittle, causing them to drop at random. This is known as "sudden limb-shear" or "widow-makers."

Albizia can be a danger to community infrastructure like roads, homes, power lines, and culverts. Large storms and hurricane season are opportune times for many trees to drop and be costly to repair.

3. Remove

Non Hazard trees can be removed or treated with multiple cost-effective DIY strategies, including 1) Hand-pull or Cut 2) Ring Barking (Bark Stripping), or 3) Applying Herbicide. If you want to remove a hazard tree, find a local arborist specializing in Albizia removal.
