

# **Legislative Review**

This month's legislative update features the Mayor's 2025 fiscal year budget proposal, projecting operating resources at \$3.96 billion. With higher revenues and COVID-19 recovery, real property taxes contribute \$1.73 billion (43.34%), and the Oʻahu Transient Accommodations Tax contribute \$93.9 million.

The FY25 Operating Program and Budget is \$3.63 billion. Notable appropriations include \$844.7 million (23.27%) for miscellaneous costs like retirement and healthcare, and debt service at \$677.6 million (18.65%). Public safety programs account for \$626.6 million (17.25%), and Mass Transit, mainly TheBus, rail, and Handi-Van, are budgeted \$427.7 million (11.77%).

The Mayor has established specific goals for all City agencies to aggressively recruit and hire the talent and skilled leadership necessary to drive economic recovery, provide exemplary core services and improve the lives of Oʻahu residents.

The FY25 Capital Program and Budget (CIP) proposes \$919 million, focusing on core services and includes improvements to the City's wastewater systems.

The City Council will be questioning the Administration and Department Directors on their budgets during Committee on Budget hearings in early March. Following discussions, members will propose amendments addressing park repairs, road repairs, infrastructure, and community-specific needs, such as fire stations.






