

ALOHA COUNCIL DISTRICT 4 NEIGHBORS!

May Day became Lei Day in Hawai'i in 1928 with a celebration in Honolulu. Lei Day received official recognition in 1929 by Governor Wallace R. Farrington, who declared May 1 of each year as "May Day is Lei Day in Hawai'i." Lei Day celebrates the spirit of aloha & proves that the meaning of a lei goes beyond flowers on a string.

The second reading of the budget bills was held during the April's Full Council Meeting. Proposals Councilmembers discussed centered around Mayor Blangiardi Administration's proposed \$3.41 billion budget & tax relief measures. Among the tax relief measures were bills to provide relief for low-income residents, kūpuna, certain individuals affected by Residential A, & homeowners renting out their properties long-term-12 months or more. In addition to other tax relief measures introduced last year, including increasing the homeowner's exemption, looking at the tax classifications, & applying a vacancy tax, the Honolulu City Council will review & consider all options to provide a holistic approach & the maximum tax relief for O'ahu homeowners.

In an effort to fund long-term tax relief solutions, the Council approved Resolution 23-40, which established a permitted interaction group to consider matters related to real property tax. The members of this group are Budget Chair Cordero, Vice Chair Kia'āina, Budget Vice Chair Weyer, & myself. We will closely examine long-term property tax relief, including the approximately 30 measures currently pending before the Honolulu City Council.

I am dedicated to making informed decisions prioritizing our community's needs & committed to transparency & public input throughout the three-month budget process. Therefore, I encourage everyone to submit testimony to the Permitted Interaction Group at www.honolulucitycouncil.org/rptmeasures. Your thoughts & opinions are invaluable to me. Please do not hesitate to contact my staff or me with questions or concerns on cityrelated issues or if you have critical community needs to be addressed in the FY 23-24 budget. We remain committed to working for you.





Honolulu Youth Commission Is Now Accepting Applications



Interested candidates who wish to participate in local government can now apply to the Honolulu Youth Commission. The commission, established in 2020 with voter approval, gives a voice to our island's youth in the decision-making process. The commission consists of fifteen commissioners, with each of the nine Councilmembers appointing one member to represent their district & six members chosen by the Honolulu Mayor.

Council District 4, which covers Hawai'i Kai to Waikīkī, is currently accepting applications for one spot on the Youth Commission. It is an excellent opportunity for young people in the district to get involved & make a difference within their community. To be eligible for the Honolulu Youth Commission, applicants must be between the ages of 14 & 24 at the time of appointment on August 1, 2023. The term would end on July 31, 2025.

It's important to note that the term of service is two years, which means that graduating High School seniors who apply will have to commit to either pursuing their college education on O'ahu or remaining on the island to fulfill their two-year commitment. Commissioners will be expected to attend at least one commission meeting per month. If an applicant is 18 years old by July 1, 2023, they must be registered to vote.



Honoring & Congratulating the Po'okela Fellows Class of 2023





Pistol & Rifle Ranges at the Koko Head Shooting Complex Re-opened April 29



The Koko Head Shooting Complex (KHSC) is a popular outdoor pistol & rifle range in East Honolulu that offers six different ranges for public sport shooting use. The Department of Parks & Recreation (DPR) is happy to announce that the KHSC reopened to the public on April 29 with some temporary changes to the operations after a long closure due to staff shortage & safety concerns. The complex underwent a major renovation project that included the following improvements:

- New dirt berms for the pistol & rifle ranges
- Painting & roofing of the structures & galleries
- Removal of damaged parts & debris
- New signage & fencing
- Enhanced public address & ceasefire alert system
- More seating areas & amenities for shooters
- Regular cleaning & air monitoring protocols

These changes are aimed at providing a safer & more enjoyable experience for our shooters. To use the pistol & rifle ranges, shooters will need to free online reservation https://pros3.hnl.info/. Reservations will open five days in advance at 8 am (HST) & will be limited to one non-transferable reservation per person, per day for both ranges. The firearm ranges will be open only on weekends, Saturdays & Sundays, from 8 am to 4 pm, & will operate as one firing line due to the damaged wall. DPR is working to increase facility staffing & repairing the wall at KHSC & asks for understanding from the community as these temporary protocols are in place. DPR is continuing to work with the various agencies who operate the other KHSC ranges regarding necessary improvements to those facilities. They remain closed to the public at this time.
