Kanoa St Encampment Town Hall

Last month, CM Dos Santos-Tam organized a town hall with other City and State officials to discuss the issues that businesses and residents face with the large, persistent homeless encampment on Kanoa Street in Pālama. The ongoing vandalism, littering, property destruction, fights, fires, crimes, and hygiene issues originating from the encampment. In response to these concerns, I introduced and successfully passed Bill 3, which expands the City's "sit-lie ban" zone to cover parts of Kanoa Street, North King Street, and Pua Lane, in and around the central Pālama area business-zoned district and within a block of Ka'iulani Elementary School. The open discussion was productive and we were able to hear the many ideas the community has in helping to resolve this issue.

Prospect-'Iolani-Alapa'i Intesection Community Meeting



On April 5, CM Dos Santos-Tam brought together members of the Punchbowl community, the Honolulu Police Department (HPD), and the Department of Transportation Services (DTS) together at Robert Louis Stevenson Middle School to discuss possible solutions to the highly dangerous five way intersection at the corner of Prospect, 'Iolani, and Alapa'i Streets. Community members such as Makiki Neighborhood Board Chair Ian Ross were in attendance, as well as Sgt Brandon Shiraishi from HPD, Deputy Director of Transportation Services Jon Nouchi and Complete Streets Administrator Renee Espiau.

CM Dos Santos-Tam and staff worked with HPD and DTS to be able to provide resident answers to questions concerning the community and how to ensure safety and prevent any more tragedies from occurring in the area.

FY2024 Budget Deliberations Continue

In the last several weeks my office has been carefully considering projects in my district that will impact the community and residents. The Chair of the Budget Committee, Councilmember Radiant Cordero and the Vice Chair is Councilmember Matt Weyer, will continue to hold committee hearings and consider the budget amendments each Councilmember is asking for on behalf of the community they're representing. The allocation of funds to different City departments, programs or projects will help to ensure our priorities will be closer to being actualized, such as increasing affordable housing, reducing homelessness, and helping to resolve the permit backlog that has persisted at the Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP).

Bill 28: Cutting Down on Drug Overdoses

With the opioid crisis spreading nationally, including here in Hawai'i, CM Dos Santos-Tam introduced Bill 28 which would require bars and nightclubs to have doses of the anti-opioid spray naloxone, also called "Narcan" on premises. Because alcohol can interact with opioids in someone's system, these venues are places where there is a higher risk of a deadly overdose. "Narcan" was recently approved by the FDA for over-the-counter sales, and Councilmember Dos Santos-Tam is now working with the State Department of Health, the

City's Liquor Commission, and private groups like HHHRC to make the required prevention doses available for free to bar and nightclub owners. This is a measure to protect public health and also to get "ahead of the curve," especially considering the 500% increase in opioid overdoses in Hawai'i between 2018-2020 and the 274 opioid overdose deaths in the islands in 2020 alone.

Bill 20: Restricted Parking Zones ("RPZ") and Upcoming Town Hall

On Tuesday, May 9th at Ka'ewai Elementary School, CM Dos Santos-Tam and Representative Mizuno are hosting a town hall meeting to discuss the City Council, Bill 20, which would allow the RPZ program to become permanent and create a framework for other neighborhoods to create an RPZ in their area.

How would Bill 20 affect the current RPZ zones?

Currently, all RPZs are temporary. Bill 20 would make the zones permanent. Currently, the only way to expand an RPZ is to pass a bill, which can take years. Bill 20 would allow the Department of Transportation to expand or change an RPZ at any time. Currently, households can purchase a maximum as four permits. Bill 20 would allow residents to apply for an exemption where they could purchase additional permits.

How would Bill 20 help areas without a current RPZ zone?

The current RPZ program can only be created after 1) residents sign and submit a petition, 2) the County becomes a study, and 3) the City Council passes a bill. Bill 20 makes it so an RPZ can be created at any time as long as there is a need and community support. At the moment the cost of an RPZ permit vary. Bill 20 would make permit costs the same for all RPZs.

Bill 21: Helping Affordable Housing in the Urban Core

With housing being a critical need in the community, and with the recent announcement that the downtown Walmart will be closing, the need to have policies to facilitate conversion of office or retail space into residential housing is more important than ever. Councilmember Dos Santos-Tam introduced Bill 21 to help align the Housing Code and the Building Code to streamline production of downtown apartments.

Honuakaha Elderly Housing Town Hall with Legislators

On April 12, CM Dos Santos-Tam, Speaker Scott Saiki, and Senator Sharon Moriwaki held a town hall for the residents of the Honuakaha Housing project in Kakaʻako. With the residents, the legislators heard the troubles that our kūpuna have been experiencing at the state-managed apartments. Issued raised included lack of building maintenance, unhygienic living conditions with black mold, and unsafe housing situations with faulty equipment and appliances. Adding to the difficulties faced by residents was a series of letters threatening eviction over tiny amounts of missed payments - in one case, as low as 50 cents. The area legislators are committed to working to improve conditions at this housing complex.

Community Outcry After Sex Assault in Abandoned Bus in Iwilei

Following the heinous incident at an abandoned bus at a boarded up gas station in Iwilei, CM Dos Santos-Tam asked the Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) to investigate the ownership of the abandoned bus and whether it being abandoned on a private lot is in violation of City ordinances regarding permanent structures. DPP has responded that they have issued a Notice of Violation, and CM Dos Santos-Tam will continue to push for the abandoned bus to be removed. Residents should feel safe in their community, and so our office will continue to advocate for the removal of negative elements from our neighborhoods.

Chinatown Senior Housing Project Hits Milestone



The Halewaiolu Senior Residences ("HSR") project, which is going up at the corner of Vineyard Blvd and River St in Chinatown near Zippy's hit a major milestone in April, as the building was "topped off," meaning that construction had reached the top floor. HSR, which had been the topic of years of community discussion, is set for completion later this year and will feature 155 one- and two-bedroom apartments. The rents will range from \$735 to \$2,300. The complex will serve as a gathering place for kūpuna and will feature a courtyard, retail space, recreation deck, laundry room, community garden, and dog park. Other amenities will include a social activities center, social services offices, property management offices, storage, a computer room, and a mailroom. The complex is also located close to public transportation and has vehicle and bicycle parking stalls. Construction on Halewai'olu Senior Residences is expected to be completed in the late summer, with residents expected to move in by September.

The \$93M development will help to revitalize the Chinatown area by adding new residents and amenities to an area which has long been underutilized.

City Launches O'ahu Compost Project in Chinatown

Three months into implementation, the Oʻahu Compost Project continues to successfully divert food waste and excess food from Oʻahu's waste stream. Edible, quality excess foods are redistributed to feed people, and food scraps are composted in an in-vessel composting unit that produces valuable soil amendment products. The Oʻahu Compost Project was made possible by a grant awarded to the City and County of Honolulu to the Climate Change, Sustainability & Resiliency Office. Through this collaborative project, which brings

local organizations together with the City government, it is hoped that we can reduce the amount of food waste produced, which comprises about 20% of the overall solid waste stream.

DPP Revokes Permit for Hanai Lp Monster Home: Cites Liliha Project

The Department of Planning and Permitting (DPP) has revoked the building permit for a large dwelling at 1532 Hanai Loop in Kamehameha heights, which was in violation of the city's "monster homes" ordinance. CM Dos Santos-Tam and Representative John Mizuno inquired into the project, and soon thereafter, DPP re-reviewed the plans and determined that incorrect information was provided to DPP, including the floor area ratio (FAR) that exceeded a threshold under the city's monster homes ordinance. The FAR is significant in determining the applicable restrictions under the ordinance. The project also exceeds the number of permitted bathrooms, and does not provide sufficient side yards and parking. Since last summer, the DPP has implemented systems to catch potential "monster homes" during the code review process, but its rollout has been uneven. For the property at 2037 Liliha Street, DPP cited the property on two separate occasions, one on January 18th, due to the first floor not being in accordance with the approved jobsite plans, in turn, an Notice of Violation (NOV) was issued. The second time DPP visited the property and found the violation was not corrected, this caused the department to issue an Notice of Order (NOO) on February 28th. On the third site visit the inspector found no new building code violations beyond the two which were previously cited.



Summer Fun Registration Begins on May 9th in our District

The City's Dept of Parks and Recreation has announced that the popular Summer Fun Program will be offered on weekdays, 8:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. from Tues, June 13 through Fri, July 28 (not including holiday on July 4). Summer Plus activities, before and/or after the regular program times, and separate seasonal classes and activities, commonly referred to as "enrichment classes" will be offered at various sites.

Children must be six years old before August 1, 2023 and not older than 13 years old by July 28, 2023 to take part in the program. Summer Fun welcomes Junior Leaders, who must be 13 years old before August 1, 2023 and no older than 17 years old by July 28, 2023 to qualify.

This year's Summer Fun registration fee is \$25.00 per keiki, with an additional activity fee of no more than \$100 for participating sites that offer extra-curricular activities. All combined fees will not exceed \$125 per keiki. Eligible families may qualify for waivers of the registration fee thanks to assistance from the U.S. Department of Human Services (DHS).

DPR will also be offering meals to keiki through the Summer Food Service Program, which is sponsored by the United States Department of Agriculture, with assistance from Federal ARPA funds.

Summer Fun Sites in our District include: Beretania Park, Booth Park, Fern Park, Kalihi Valley District Park, Kauluwela Park, Lanakila Park, and Pu'unui Park

Registration for the Parks in our District starts on May 9 at 4 p.m.
