city legislative highlights:

- Bill 53: The purpose of this ordinance is to amend the island-wide fare structure, including paratransit fares.
- <u>Resolution 22-259:</u> This resolution is related to the proposed Kuilei Place affordable and market rate condominium project that will be located in the Moiliili District.
- Resolution 22-244: This resolution confirms the Mayor's appointees to serve on the inaugural Economic Revitalization Commission of the City and County of Honolulu. These commissioners will be preparing a five-year strategic plan that will include strategies for the city to encourage equitable and sustainable economic advancement, development of new businesses and industries, and reinvestment.
- Primary Urban Center Development Plan: The Primary Urban Center stretches from Kahala to Pearl City and includes major economic activity hubs. The PUC Development Plan Public Review Draft has been released and the Department of Planning and Permitting is accepting public comments through January 31, 2023. Did You Know?

The University of Hawai'i at Mānoa got its start in 1907 and first taught students in what is now the Honolulu Museum of Art School across Thomas Square. As a land-grant institution, one of the school's primary focuses was agriculture. In September of 1912, the school moved to its current site in Mānoa. Some of the first structures on the new campus were sheds to house mules, chickens, and dairy cattle, some of the first dormers! To the right is a picture from the 1910s. Such a sharp contrast to the campus of today with modern buildings like C-MORE Hale, the Information Technology Center, and the Warrior Recreation Center.
